FACES *Join the* FRONTLINES ▶

As an implementing agency of the U.S. President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR), CDC is at the forefront of the global response to the world's two deadliest infectious diseases – HIV and TB. CDC plays a unique role, bringing **scientific know-how** and **on-the-ground expertise** to bring about significant **impact** in the fight against these dual epidemics. Just within this past year, our efforts accounted for **more than 50 percent** of key PEPFAR outcomes to treat and prevent HIV and TB. These outcomes are **driving progress** towards ending these diseases, **saving millions of lives** at home and abroad, and **saving costs into the future**.

HIV CARE AND TREATMENT



CDC is at the forefront of efforts to get life-saving treatment to millions of people living with HIV around the world. In 2023, **as a part of PEPFAR, CDC supported antiretroviral treatment for 12.6 million** people living with HIV* – more than 40% of all people on treatment worldwide.

VOLUNTARY MEDICAL MALE CIRCUMCISION (VMMC)



VMMC has been shown to reduce a man's risk of acquiring HIV by up to 60 percent. From 2007-2023, **CDC supported VMMC procedures for nearly 17 million men** in Southern and Eastern Africa** – more than half of all VMMC procedures supported by PEPFAR.

HIV DIAGNOSES



Helping people with HIV know their status and start immediately on treatment allows them to live longer and healthier lives and interrupts the spread of HIV. In 2023, **CDC helped 1.1 million people learn their HIV-positive status***, over 50% of all new HIV diagnoses identified through PEPFAR.

TB SCREENING FOR PEOPLE LIVING WITH HIV



TB is the top killer of people living with HIV, whose weakened immune systems make them susceptible to becoming ill with TB. In 2023, **CDC supported TB screenings for 10.2 million people with HIV*** – 60% of all people with HIV screened for TB through PEPFAR.

PREVENTION OF MOTHER-TO-CHILD TRANSMISSION



Increasing the number of pregnant women on life-saving HIV treatment helps mothers live longer, healthier lives and helps eliminate new infections among children. In 2023, **CDC supported treatment for more than 445,000 HIV-positive, pregnant women** to reduce the risk of mother-to-child transmission* – over 60% of all pregnant women who received HIV treatment through PEPFAR.
