

Educators: Get the Facts on Youth Vaping

AUDIO: Music without lyrics playing through the end of the video.

TEXT GRAPHICS APPEAR: It is dangerous for young people to use e-cigarettes (also known as vapes). Most vapes contain nicotine.

TEXT GRAPHICS APPEAR: As an educator, you can talk with your students about the risks of vaping.

TEXT GRAPHICS APPEAR: Nicotine can harm the developing brain. Brain development continues until about age 25.

TEXT GRAPHICS APPEAR: What is an e-cigarette? Students refer to electronic cigarettes by many different names: Vapes, Disposables, E-hookahs, Mods, or Vape pens.

TEXT GRAPHICS APPEAR: They also refer to them by brand names, such as Puff Bar, JUUL, or Hyde.

TEXT GRAPHICS APPEAR: Vapes come in many shapes, sizes, and flavors – and many of them are easy to conceal.

VISUALS: A sheet of paper appears with several other background items such as a USB a pen, e-cigarettes that blend in and a cellphone

TEXT GRAPHICS APPEAR: Some vapes look like cigarettes, cigars, or pipes. Others can be the same size and shape as a USB flash drive or pen. Other devices can be as big as a smartphone.

VISUALS: Two e-cigarettes appear. One gets plugged into a charging cable, sparks fly.

TEXT GRAPHICS APPEAR: There are many types of vapes. Some are disposable. Others are rechargeable and refillable.

VISUALS: Three e-cigarettes appear with cherry written on them; cherries are floating through the air.

TEXT GRAPHICS APPEAR: E-cigarettes come in various flavors, including fruit, candy, mint, and menthol. About 85% of youth who vape use flavors.

VISUALS: Illustrated lungs appear and inflate and deflate, and a yellow line connects image to the text box.

TEXT GRAPHICS APPEAR: Vapes heat a liquid into an aerosol (tiny particles or droplets in the air) that a person inhale. Vape aerosol can contain harmful and potentially harmful substances, such as heavy metals and cancer-causing chemicals.

TEXT GRAPHICS APPEAR: As an educator, you play an important role in your students' lives. Be a positive influence by talking with your students about the risks of vaping.
